

UNIT 13 | SESSION 4 ELISHA PERFORMED MIRACLES 2 KINGS 4-6

KEY PASSAGE:

Deuteronomy 6:4-5

BIG PICTURE QUESTION:

What is idolatry? Idolatry is a sin of the heart in which we love and value something else above God.

CHRIST CONNECTION:

Elisha's miracles showed that he was a prophet of the one true God and that God's words were true. In a greater way, Jesus' miracles show that He is the true Son of God.



PRIOR TO TEACHING THE SESSION



LEADER Bible Study

Miracles are often found in Scripture as a means of God doing what nature cannot explain to show His own power and authority over all things. This portion of 2 Kings 4–6 is no different. But these miracles don't just teach us about God; they also demonstrate our human nature by revealing doubt in our hearts as we encounter circumstances beyond our control.

Many of the miracles performed by Elisha in 2 Kings 4–6 come in moments when the human dilemmas of sin, death, fear, worry, and lack are realized and people are overtaken with doubt.

Have you ever felt this way? Have you ever felt as if your back was against the wall, your limits had been reached, and there was no way and no reason for hope in a particular situation? If so, you're not alone. We all have moments when it seems as if we're done and there's no way out.

The reason we all experience these things is because we are humans. Our limitedness leaves us lacking and in moments where that lack prevents us from saving ourselves, we cannot help but feel doubtful.

But God.

It is often in these moments that we are reminded of just how self-reliant we tend to be and just how God-dependent we truly are. God in these moments of doubt becomes our only hope, our beacon, our help. And though we ought to have some sense of confidence in this all the time, the reality is that we often lose sight of how deeply we need the Lord until He is our only way out.

What if we lived dependent on God to this degree all the time? What if we lived knowing that our only hope was God's provision, even when it doesn't feel like we need it? What if we saw that even our own ability to find a way out of a dire situation was a gift from Him?

The mystery that God wants to make known to those around us is this: "Christ in

you, the hope of glory" (Col. 1:27). Is your confidence so firm in the Lord as provider and sustainer that it demonstrates the hope of Christ to those around you? If not, be reminded today that He isn't just your help from time to time, but your only hope time and time again.

PEOPLE TO KNOW

Naaman: Syrian general cured of leprosy under the direction of the prophet Elisha. Following his cleansing, he professed faith in Israel's God.



WELCOME Kids

Greet each kid as he or she arrives. Use this time to collect the offering, fill out attendance sheets, build relationships, and help new kids connect to your group.

SAY 🚅 Have you ever swam in a river? What was it like? 🇾

1 ACTIVITY PAGE (5 minutes)

Invite kids to complete "Miracles" on the activity page.

SAY ⁶⁶ The Bible has many stories about miracles. God is an amazing God who is able to do amazing things! In our Bible story today, we will learn about some miracles God performed through the prophet Elisha. **J**

2 SESSION STARTER (10 minutes)

OPTION 1: WILL IT FLOAT?

Form groups of four or five kids. Distribute a bowl or pan filled with water to each group. Provide each group with paper and pencils. In the front of the room, set up a table with various objects for kids to test whether the objects sink or float. Direct kids to come to the table, choose an object, and take it back to their group to experiment.

Encourage kids to experiment with as many objects as they can. Challenge kids to write down which objects float and which objects sink, so they can share with the group.

Distribute paper towels to each group to wipe up any spills.

SAY Some objects float in water and some sink. Today, we will see how Elisha performed miracles to demonstrate God's power. One of these miracles was making a sinking object float in the water.

OPTION 2: GOD'S GOT THE POWER



Form two teams of kids. Lead each team to line up on one side of the room and place a dry erase board for each team on the opposite side of the room. Challenge each team to choose one kid to race to the dry erase board and write something that demonstrates God's power, such as creating the world. Kids will run back to their team and the next kid will race to the board. Tell kids that they cannot repeat the same answers as their teammates.

Continue playing until all kids have raced to the board and back.

SAY 66 God has infinite power. Nothing is impossible for Him. We see His power in creation and we read about it in the Bible. We experience His power when He saves us from our sin. Today, we will read His Word to learn how God used Elisha to perform miracles. **55**

INTRODUCE the Bible Story

1 INTRODUCE THE SESSION (3 minutes)

Show the countdown video as you transition to introduce the Bible story. Set it to end as the session begins.

SAY ff Welcome! I'm so glad you're here! My name is **[your name]** and today we are going to study another story from the Bible. If you brought your Bible today, would you take it out and set it on your lap? **[Distribute Bibles to any kid who does not have one.]**

Did you know that God created the world by only speaking? God is all-powerful and His words also contain power. When we read the Bible, God works through His words to transform us to be more like Jesus. Today, we will learn how God's power shows us He is the one true God. **J**

2 BIG PICTURE QUESTION (1 minute)

SAY SAY SAY

In today's story, we will see how God demonstrated, through the miracles He allowed Elisha to perform, that He is the one true God and the only One worthy of worship. Let's say our big picture question and answer one more time. What is idolatry? Idolatry is a sin of the heart in which we love and value something else above God. **J**

3 REVIEW THE TIMELINE (1 minute)

Show the giant timeline. Point to individual Bible stories as you review.

SAY II Many prophets of the Old Testament were able to perform miracles. God gave the prophets His spirit to speak His words to the people and demonstrate His power. Last week, we learned how God gave Elisha His spirit. God's spirit allowed Elisha to part the water and demonstrate to the people that God's power had come upon him. Today, we will see how God used Elisha as he performed miracles to point others to God.



THE STORY OF THE GOSPEL

LEARN the Bible Story

1 TELL THE BIBLE STORY: VIDEO OR STORYTELLER (10 minutes)

Open your Bible to 2 Kings 4–6. Use the Bible storytelling tips to help you tell the story, or show the Bible story video "Elisha Performed Miracles." Use the bold text to retell or review the story.

ELISHA PERFORMED MIRACLES

Content Elisha was a prophet to the people of Israel. One day, a man brought him 20 loaves of bread. Elisha told the man to give it to a crowd of 100 men. The man was confused, but Elisha said, "The Lord says there will be enough." So the man gave the bread to the crowd and everyone ate. They even had some left over.

Another time, Elisha healed a man named Naaman (NAY muhn) of a serious skin disease. Naaman was the commander of the Syrian army. He had gone to the king of Israel to ask for healing. The king of Israel said, "Am I God? Do I have the power to give life and take it away? Why does this man think I can cure a skin disease?" The king of Israel could not heal Naaman. The power to heal comes only from God.

Elisha the prophet called Naaman to his house. Naaman stood at the door, ready to be healed! But Elisha didn't come to the door. Instead, he sent a message to Naaman: "Go wash seven times in the Jordan River."

When Naaman went to the Jordan River and dipped himself in the water seven times, his skin was healed!

Naaman and all the people with him went to Elisha. **"I know that the God of Israel is the one true God," Naaman said.**

On another day, Elisha met with a group of prophets at the Jordan River. The prophets were cutting down trees by the river, when an iron ax head fell into the water and sank. Elisha cut a stick and threw it into the water, and the iron floated back to the top.

Christ Connection: Elisha's miracles showed that he was a prophet of the one true God and that God's words were true. In a greater way, Jesus' miracles show that He is the true Son of God. **JJ**

STORYTELLING TIPS

Use props: Display items, such as bread loaves and a picture of the Jordan River, that remind kids of the miracles Elisha performed in the story. Hold up the items as they are mentioned in the story.

Act it out: Invite kids to play the roles of Elisha, the man with the 20 loaves, Naaman, and the group of prophets as you tell the story.

2 REVIEW THE BIBLE STORY

SAY ff God allowed Elisha to perform miracles to show the people that He is the one true God. One of the miracles Elisha performed took place when a man gave him 20 loaves of bread to feed a crowd of 100 men. Why was Elisha confident that the 20 loaves would be enough to feed a whole crowd? Look at 2 Kings 4:43. **[Choose a volunteer to read aloud 2 Kings 4:43.]** Elisha had confidence because the Lord told him that the bread would be enough to feed the people and still have leftovers. Elisha trusted that God will always do what He says.

We also learned about another miracle Elisha performed when he healed Naaman from a skin disease. How many times did Naaman have to wash in the Jordan River? [Allow responses.] Yes, Naaman washed seven times. God healed Naaman and Naaman believed that God was the one true God. Miracles are always used to point people to God.

What was the last miracle we read about? [Allow responses.] Yes, Elisha threw a stick in the water and made the ax float to the surface. Again, God was demonstrating that He alone is God.

God's power is at work in our lives as well. When we believe in Jesus, we are raised from death to life. The Bible reminds us that we were dead in our sins, but through faith in Jesus have been raised to life. **J**

3 CHRIST CONNECTION

(Tip: Use Scripture and the Gospel Plan Poster to explain how to become a Christian. Make sure kids know when and where they can ask questions.)

QUESTIONS FROM KIDS (3 minutes)

Show the "Unit 13, Session 4" questions from kids video. Prompt kids to discuss:

- 1. Does God still heal people today? What if He doesn't?
- 2. What miracles did Jesus perform that showed He is God?

5 MISSIONS MOMENT (3 minutes)

Display the "Send Relief Photos" as you tell the story.

The organization Send Relief has over 140 ongoing COVID-19 related projects in more than 45



nations to help provide medical equipment, needed cleaning items, supplies of oxygen, and food. Some of these areas are remote villages and regions that did not receive as much help as bigger cities. **JJ**

Close in prayer, asking God to continue to help people be generous to help others who are in need.

6 KEY PASSAGE ACTIVITY (5 minutes)

Show the key passage poster. Lead kids in reading aloud Deuteronomy 6:4-5 together.

Form kids into a circle. When you start the music, direct kids to pass the beanbag or the ball around the circle until the music stops. After 10 seconds, stop the music and challenge the kid who is holding the beanbag or ball to say the first word of the key passage. If he has trouble remembering the word, work together as a group to think of the word. Continue until the whole key passage is complete.

SAY *ff* It's so important to memorize God's Word. As we treasure God's Word in our hearts and minds, we are better able to obey it. **J**

Lead kids to sing "The Lord Our God (Deuteronomy 6:4-5)." You may also choose to sing a worship song of your choice.

PRAY (2 minutes)

Invite kids to pray before transitioning to Love.

SAY God, thank You that we can be confident that anything You say is true and that You will always do what You say you will do. Help us trust You with every part of our lives. Amen.
