Sermon Date: Sunday, February 23



Romans 8 is considered one of the greatest chapters in the Bible, as it describes the Christian life and our true identity in Christ. Many believers struggle with feelings of doubt, fear, and unworthiness, often falling for the enemy's lies about who they really are. This study will explore how Romans 8:12-17 reveals three key identity declarations that help us break free from these spiritual scams. By understanding that we are no longer debtors to the flesh, are led by the Holy Spirit, and are fully adopted into God's family, we can live with confidence and joy.

Key Passage: Romans 8:12-17

Discussion Questions:

1. Why does the enemy try to deceive us about our identity in Christ? How can we recognize his lies? What lies have you believed about yourself? How can you replace them with truth from God's Word?

The enemy wants to keep us enslaved to sin and fear by making us doubt our identity in Christ. His lies often center on guilt, shame, and worthlessness. Romans 8:15 reminds us that we are not slaves to fear but adopted as children of God. We combat the enemy's lies by holding onto God's truth about who we are in Christ.

2. What does it mean to no longer be a debtor to the flesh?

Being a debtor to the flesh means living under the control of sinful desires. Romans 8:12-13 teaches that we are no longer obligated to live according to our old sinful nature but are empowered by the Holy Spirit to overcome sin.

3. How does living by the Spirit change how we respond to life challenges? Think of a situation where you reacted in the flesh instead of being led by the Spirit. How would responding differently have changed the outcome?

Living by the Spirit means being sensitive to His promptings, which leads to peace and wisdom rather than impulsiveness and sin. Romans 8:14 teaches that being led by the Spirit is a mark of our identity in Christ. When we react in the flesh, we often experience regret and brokenness, but responding by the Spirit fosters patience, kindness, and godliness.

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4. What practical steps can we take to ensure we are led by the Spirit daily?

We can be led by the Spirit by spending time in God's Word and praying daily, asking for His guidance, and remaining sensitive to His promptings. Romans 8:14 reminds us that those who are led by the Spirit are sons of God.

5. Why does Paul contrast being led by the Spirit with living in fear? In what areas of life can fear keep us from fully trusting God? How can embracing our identity as God's children help us overcome that fear?

Romans 8:15 states that we did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear but the Spirit of adoption. Fear often comes from uncertainty and a lack of trust in God's provision, but knowing we are fully accepted and loved by God allows us to rest in His care and sovereignty.

6. What does it mean to be adopted into God's family? How does being an adopted child of God change how we view our past mistakes and future potential.

Adoption in biblical times granted full rights and privileges to someone who was previously an outsider. Romans 8:15-16 shows that we are not second-class citizens in God's kingdom; we are His beloved children. This truth helps us reject shame from past failures and live confidently in our purpose.

7. What does it mean to be heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ? Consider how this truth changes your perspective on suffering and hardship.

Romans 8:17 explains that as heirs, we share in both Christ's sufferings and His future glory. This means that hardships are not pointless but are part of our journey with Christ. When we understand our eternal inheritance, we can endure suffering with hope.

8. How can we practically 'put to death the deeds of the body' as mentioned in Romans 8:13?

Putting to death sinful behaviors means actively resisting temptation and relying on the Holy Spirit. Strategies include accountability, renewing our minds with Scripture, and replacing sinful habits with godly ones. Romans 8:13 reminds us that we can overcome sin's power by the Spirit.

9. Why does Paul emphasize calling God' Abba, Father'?

'Abba' is an intimate term for a father, signifying closeness and trust. Romans 8:15 shows that our relationship with God is not distant or formal but personal and loving. This truth gives us confidence to approach Him in prayer, knowing He cares deeply for us.

10. How can we live according to our new identity in Christ rather than fall back into old patterns?

Aligning our behavior with our identity in Christ requires the daily renewal of our minds (Romans 12:2). Romans 8:16 assures us that the Holy Spirit testifies to our identity. A declaration like "I am a child of God, led by the Spirit, no longer a slave to sin or fear" can help reinforce this truth.
